Executive Summary:

Hapinoy Project Bagong Araw began its groundwork last April 2014. Month 1 of the Program had to be moved one month later to facilitate last minute Donors and to further iron out details with the partner Microfinance Institutions (MFI). Project Bagong Araw Month 1 formally happened on June 2014 where MVF started to train potential beneficiaries. By the start of July 2014, all the slots sponsored by Donors have been filled-up by qualifying beneficiaries, after MVF and the partner Microfinance Institutions' (MFI) validation process. Towards the end of July 2014, three weeks later than projected completion, all the first tranche of the loans to the beneficiaries have been disbursed.

TYF CONTRIBUTES TO EGG-LAYING LIVELIHOOD PROGRAM IN BASEY, SAMAR

Hi Tanging Yaman Foundation,

I am almost always at the community facilitating whatever help we could provide to the affected families.

The 1st shipment of egg machines (consisting of 10 sets) have already been delivered to identified barangays and are being managed by women organizations. SAC did a brief social preparation activity with the identified women groups / organizations particularly regarding safe and viable site, management concerns and other important considerations. The following are the beneficiary barangays of the egg machine project.

The feeding regimen had been posted in each chicken house and only 1 caretaker is in charge of feeding to minimize stress. Other members have their own regular assigned tasks (cleaning, recording and marketing). Meanwhile, the SAC and the parish teams continue to monitor the project and regularly communicate with PILMICO for technical assistance.

The SAC also envisions integrating the egg laying project with organic vegetable production, thus it intends to train women beneficiaries on organic vegetables and to utilize the chicken manure as organic fertilizer. This engagement would necessarily diversify production and rural income.

This project is relatively new and of small scale but the women groups are already generating an initial income from the sales of the eggs for local consumption.

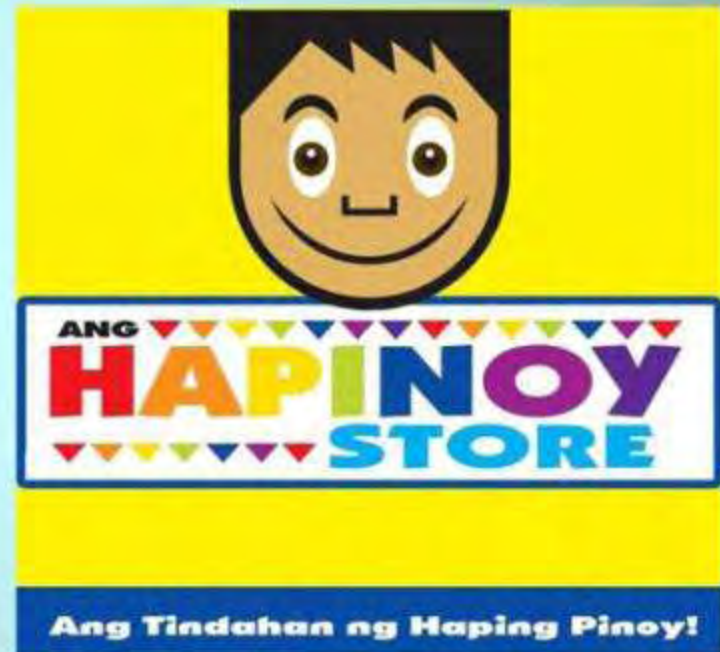

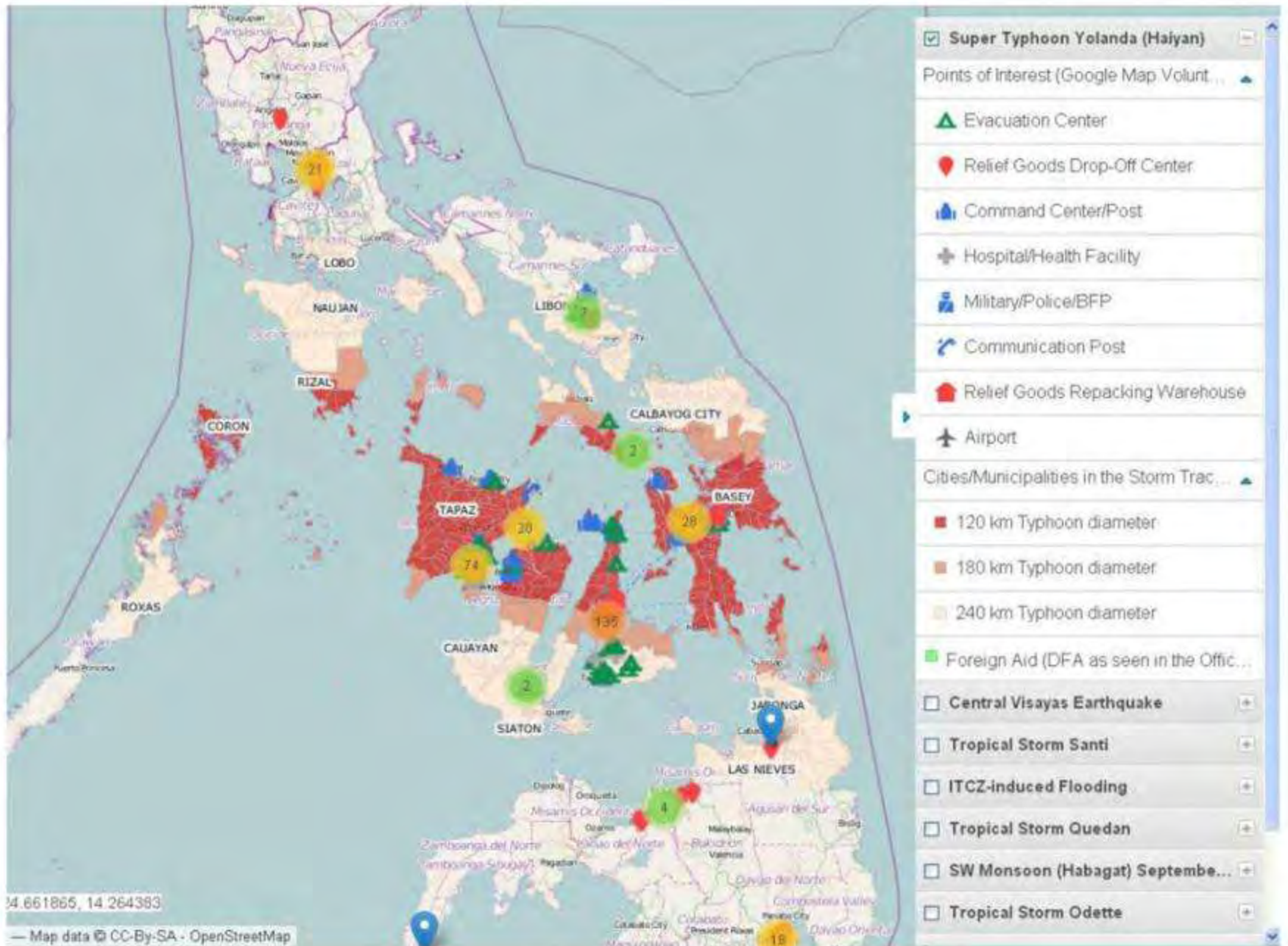

Relief Updates for Culion

- The yacht containing the 1,100 packs bound for Culion is making its way to the island. The previous report showed that 2000 packs was loaded but we the capacity of the truck could only accomodate 1, 100 packs.
- The Philippine Navy contact has loaded the 1000 packs of goods also for Culion.
- There will be another shipment on Wednesday using the yacht again.
- There are already plans for rehabilitation. This will include

- Livelihood through reviving the cooperative system, the ADNU-supported Eco Tourism, other social enterprises like Kawil Tours, FINE (Filipino Innovators, Nation-builder, Earth-advocates)
- Renewable energy by installing solar panels for electricity and water filters care of Solar Solutions, Inc.
- Community-Based Disaster Risk Reduction Management
- Psycho-social support care of the Ateneo de Manila University

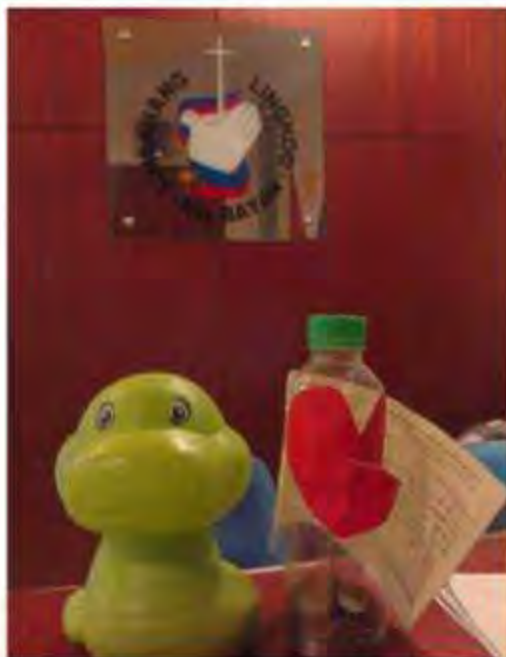

B. JESUIT PROTOCOL

Jesuit Networking and Collaboration in Disaster Response Protocol

What is the Jesuit Disaster Coordination Protocol?

The Jesuit Disaster Coordination Protocol is a system that outlines procedures and actions to be taken by Jesuit institutions (initially in the Philippines) in deciding and responding to the potential and immediate impact of an extreme weather event.



This protocol covers five phases:

- Phase 1 - where we mitigate and prepare during ordinary time
- Phase 2 – where we are on alert and we issue warnings and identify the emerging disaster event
- Phase 3 – where we undertake disaster response and relief immediately as soon as possible
- Phase 4 – where recovery and rehabilitation take place during the weeks and months after the disaster
- Phase 5 – where there is restructuring and re-designing, building back better, during the months and years after the disaster

UNDERLYING FACTORS IN RESPONDING TO DISASTER

1. **Disaster area engagement and resilience:** This highlights the importance of engaging local community as partners or stakeholders in the process of disaster response, rather than as passive beneficiaries.
2. **Organizational networking in support of community:** Coordination is a critical element in disaster response, which involves establishing open communication channels and networks with stakeholders. Disaster relief and response can be facilitated through effective communications to a broader audience that may be looking for updates and ways to assist.
3. **Broader national and international responsibilities for information and accountability:** On an international level, it is also critical to provide updates on local needs in post-disaster areas and to ensure accountability in reporting on any donations of relief goods or financial assistance.

Why is a Jesuit Disaster Coordination Protocol needed?

With the increased frequency and intensity of extreme weather events hitting the Philippines, and with the breadth of response needed, Jesuit institutions that are geographically spread in various parts of the country through our different ministries need to work together and collaborate. Individual institutions such as the universities may have in place specific protocols and ways of proceeding in responding to disaster events. There is also networking and collaboration that occur especially during relief and emergency responses. While these are all good, these may also be inadequate and do not tap fully into the competencies and resources that can be made available.

Who is the Coordinating Team of the Jesuit Disaster Coordination Protocol and what will this team do?

The Coordinating Team is a core group of Jesuit institutions in the Philippines sharing their competence and experiences in disaster risk reduction (DRR) work. This team takes the initial responsibility to communicate alerts on an impending extreme event and undertake rapid area analysis immediately after the impact of the extreme event. At the moment, the team is composed of key individuals from Simbahang Lingkod ng Bayan (SLB), Society of Jesus Social Apostolate (SJSA), Ateneo de Manila University, Xavier University, Manila Observatory (MO), and the Environmental Science for Social Change (ESSC).

When is the Jesuit Disaster Coordination Protocol mobilized?

During ordinary time, the Coordinating Team communicates and shares ongoing work activities and training in DRR amongst Jesuit institutions during Phase 1. The work shifts to Phase 2 when there is an impending weather event that is monitored through the Weather Update page (<http://essc.org.ph/content/weather-update/>), proceeding to Phases 3 and 4 as maybe necessary, as illustrated in the decision and action flow diagram.

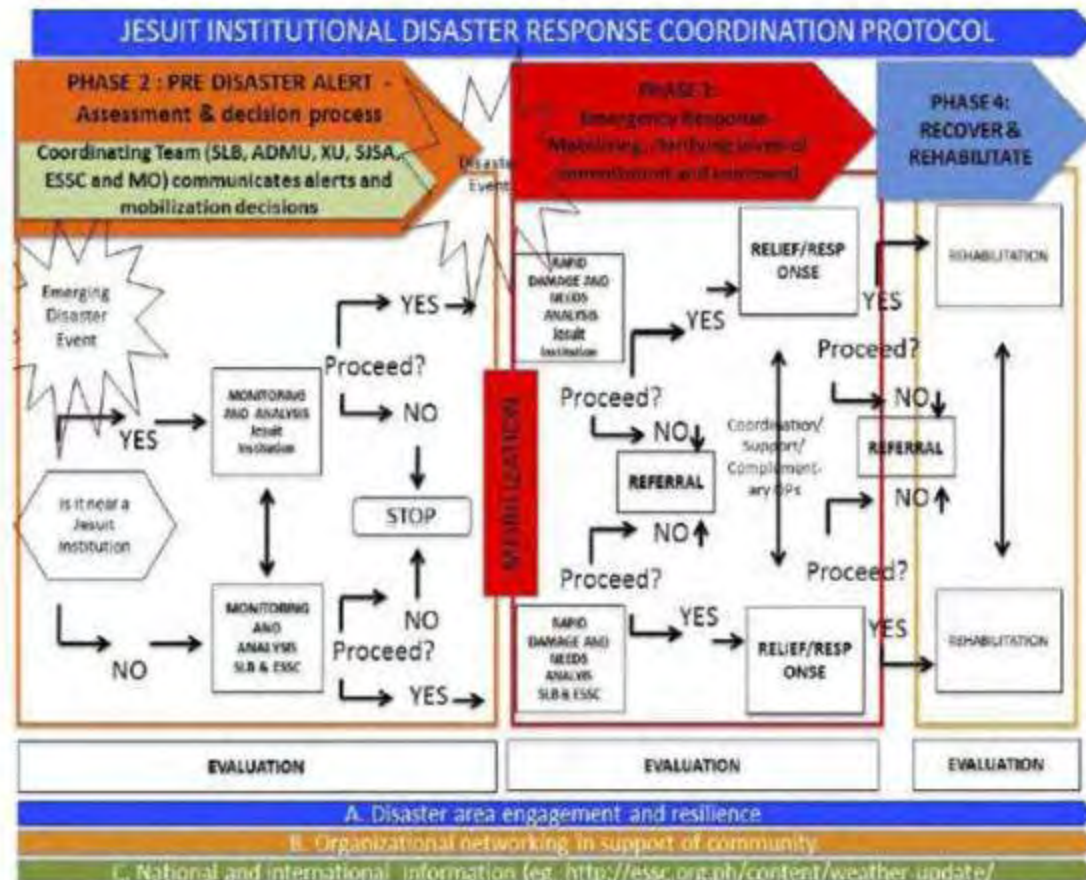

The Coordinating Team then uses the criteria of scope and nature of the disaster in recommending decisions and mobilizing responses. The scope of the disaster means that the situation is of national concern. The nature of the event involves the geological, hydro-meteorological, or human-induced factors that can lead to, and has resulted in, a disaster. These include typhoons, flooding, landslides, drought, the onset of which can be communicated through alerts and the impact rapidly assessed for specific areas. For tsunami, earthquakes, volcanic eruptions, and other exceptional cases such as armed conflict situations for which forecast may not always be possible, the point of action is emergency response.

Phase 5 is the long-term restructuring and re-designing where Jesuit institutions initiate action or contribute to ongoing efforts so that we are "building back better."

Jesuit institutions contribute to site assessments of proposed and actual housing areas, provide livelihood and housing assistance, psychosocial support, assist local government land and water use planning, and focus national attention through discussions and dialogues with national government and international agencies to build back better, not just the housing, but the lives and livelihoods of people and communities.
